

FAMILY (OTHER) PROBLEMS

BASED ON FINDINGS FROM THE EVERYDAY LEGAL PROBLEMS AND THE COST OF JUSTICE IN CANADA SURVEY:

Within a three-year period, about 123,000 Canadians over the age of 18 experience one or more serious family problems involving a child that are difficult to resolve.

Of these family problems experienced by people in Canada:

ABOUT
36,000 relate to serious problems **becoming the guardian of the child.**

ABOUT
25,000 involve having **one or more children under their guardianship being taken away** by a child family services agency.

ABOUT
31,000 involve getting **legal representation for a child involved in a dispute.**

ABOUT
14,000 involve a **child abduction or potential abduction.**

ABOUT
64,000 relate to a **child who was unfairly expelled from school.**

Overview of the Cost of Justice project. The Cost of Justice project (2011-2017) examines the social and economic costs of Canada's justice system. It is guided by two questions: What is the cost of delivering access to justice? And what is the cost of not delivering access to justice? Comprised of leading researchers investigating various dimensions of access to justice and cost across the country, the Cost of Justice project is producing empirical data that will inform the future of access to justice in Canada and abroad. The lead research team includes: Trevor C.W. Farrow (Principal Investigator), Nicole Aylwin, Les Jacobs, Lisa Moore, and Diana Lowe.
